SQE facts and stats

- 24,090 candidates have passed SQE1
- Of all candidates who have entered SQE1, 66% have passed
- 11,761 candidates have passed SQE2
- Of all candidates who have entered SQE2, 85% have passed
- The SQE1 pass rate for solicitor apprentices is 73%, across all who have received results to date
- The SQE2 pass rate for solicitor apprentices is 94%, across all how have received results to date

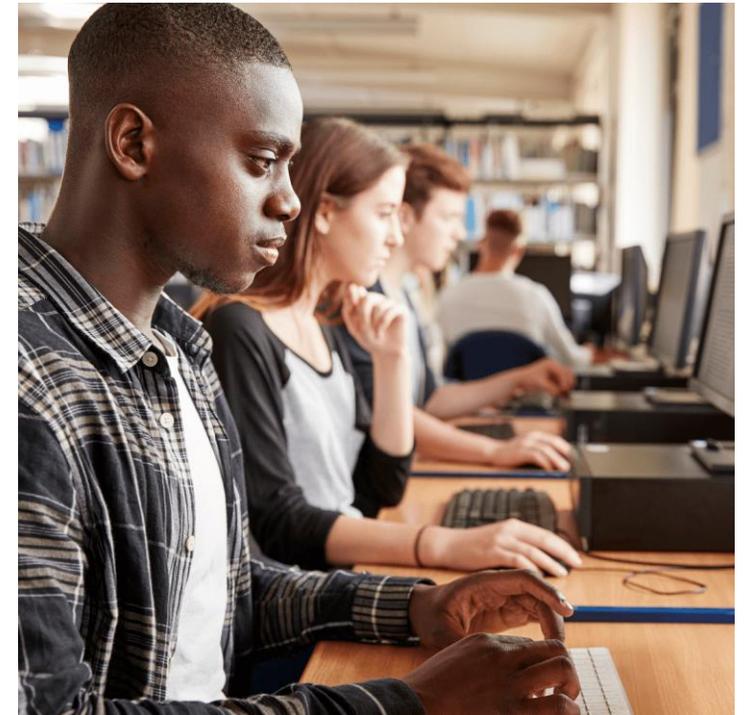

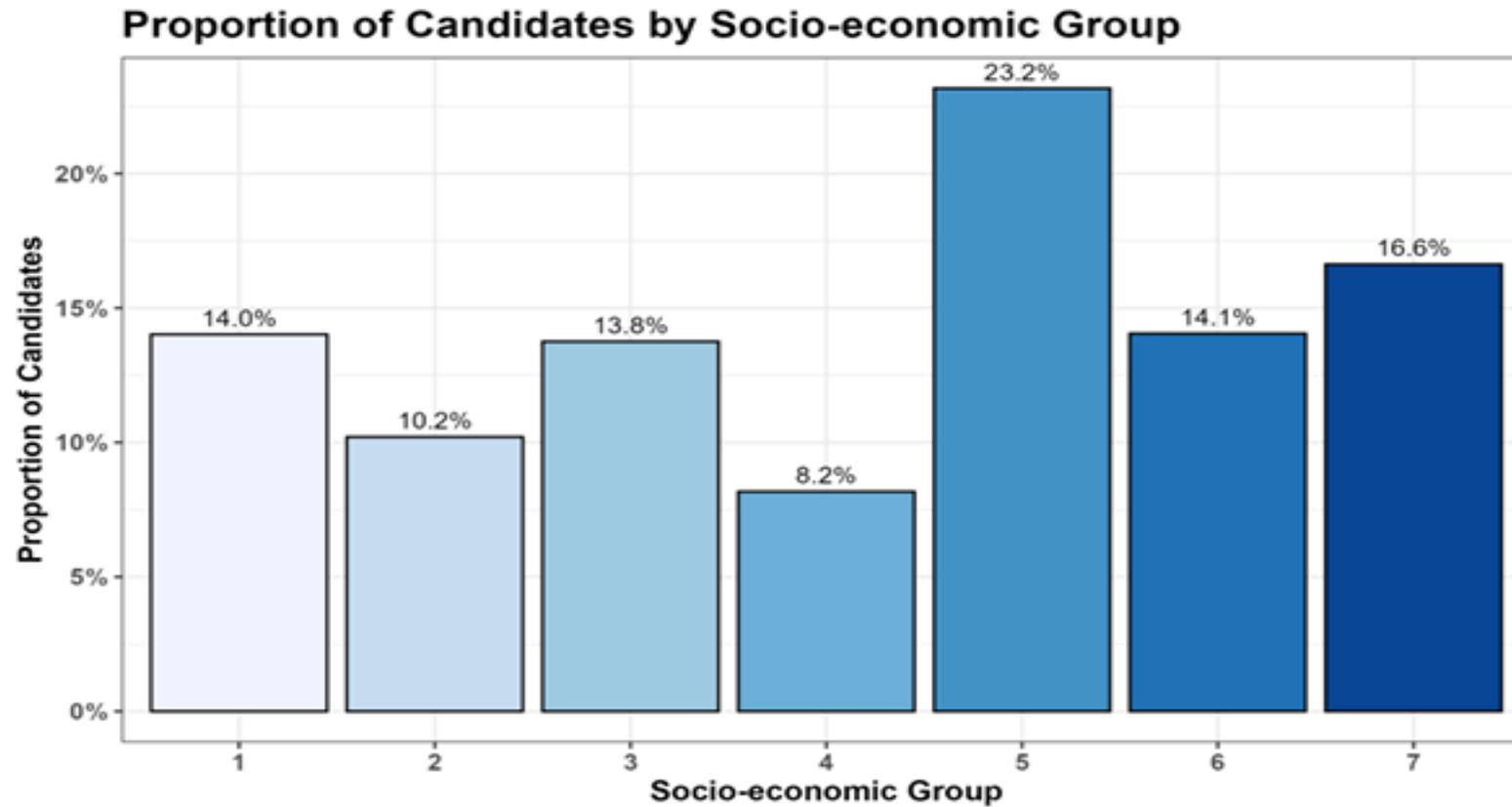
Candidate characteristics data

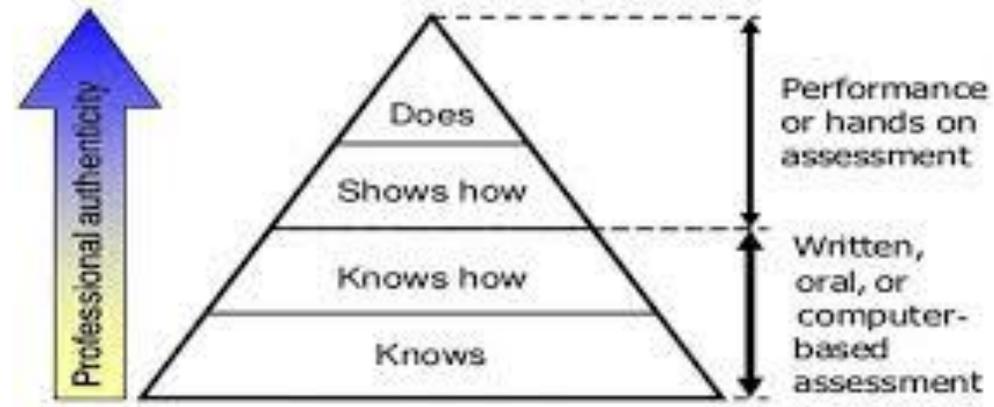

Evaluating work-based learning

Miller's Pyramid and SQE1

- SQE1: application of legal knowledge
- 'Knows how'
- Statement of Solicitor Competence:

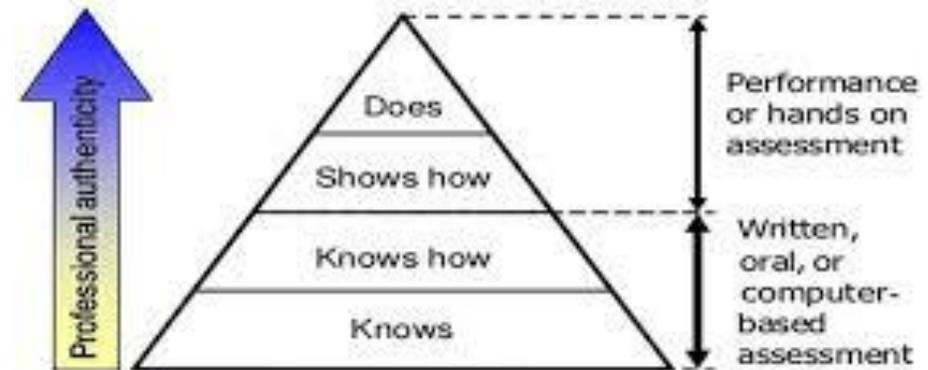
Maintain a level of legal knowledge

Draw on a sufficient detailed knowledge and understanding of their field(s) of work

Use ... a broad base of legal knowledge....and detailed knowledge of their practice area.

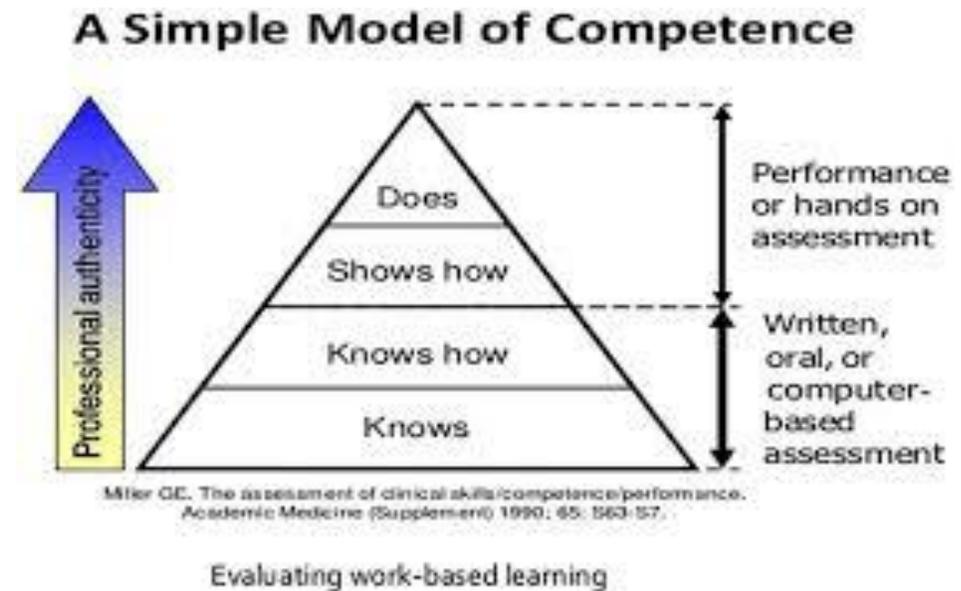

- SQE2: legal skills (written and oral)
- 16 stations
- 'Shows how'
- Statement of Solicitor Competence
- Authenticity?



What are single best answer multiple choice questions?

Single best answer (SBA) multiple choice questions (MCQs) are used in SQE1 to assess candidates' ability to apply their legal knowledge.

- The questions do not assess simple recall
- They assess a candidate's ability to apply their knowledge to a relevant scenario
- The scenarios reflect the type of matter a newly qualified solicitor might come across in practice.

There are three components to each question:

1. The stem, which sets out the scenario.
2. The lead in, which sets out the question to be answered.
3. The five options. Each of the five options is plausible, **but only one is correct.**

Who writes the questions?

- Solicitors
- Minimum of two (usually three) solicitor subject matter experts
- Further review by two more solicitors
- SRA solicitor subject matter expert review
- Each question involves a minimum of four, usually five, solicitors.

Why are they appropriate for high stakes professional assessment?

SBAAs are a well-established method of assessing the application of knowledge:

- Standardised scoring: single correct answer
- Quick and accurate marking of a large number of candidates
- Effectively sample a wide breadth of a curriculum
- Assessment of high order thinking
- Test security
- Removes the need for written expression

What are the alternatives?

- Essays
- Short answer questions
- Extended match questions
- Long answer questions
- Role play

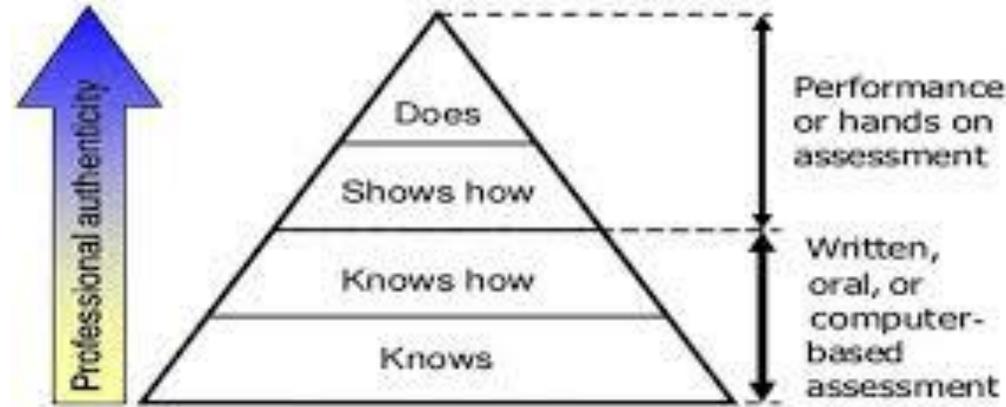

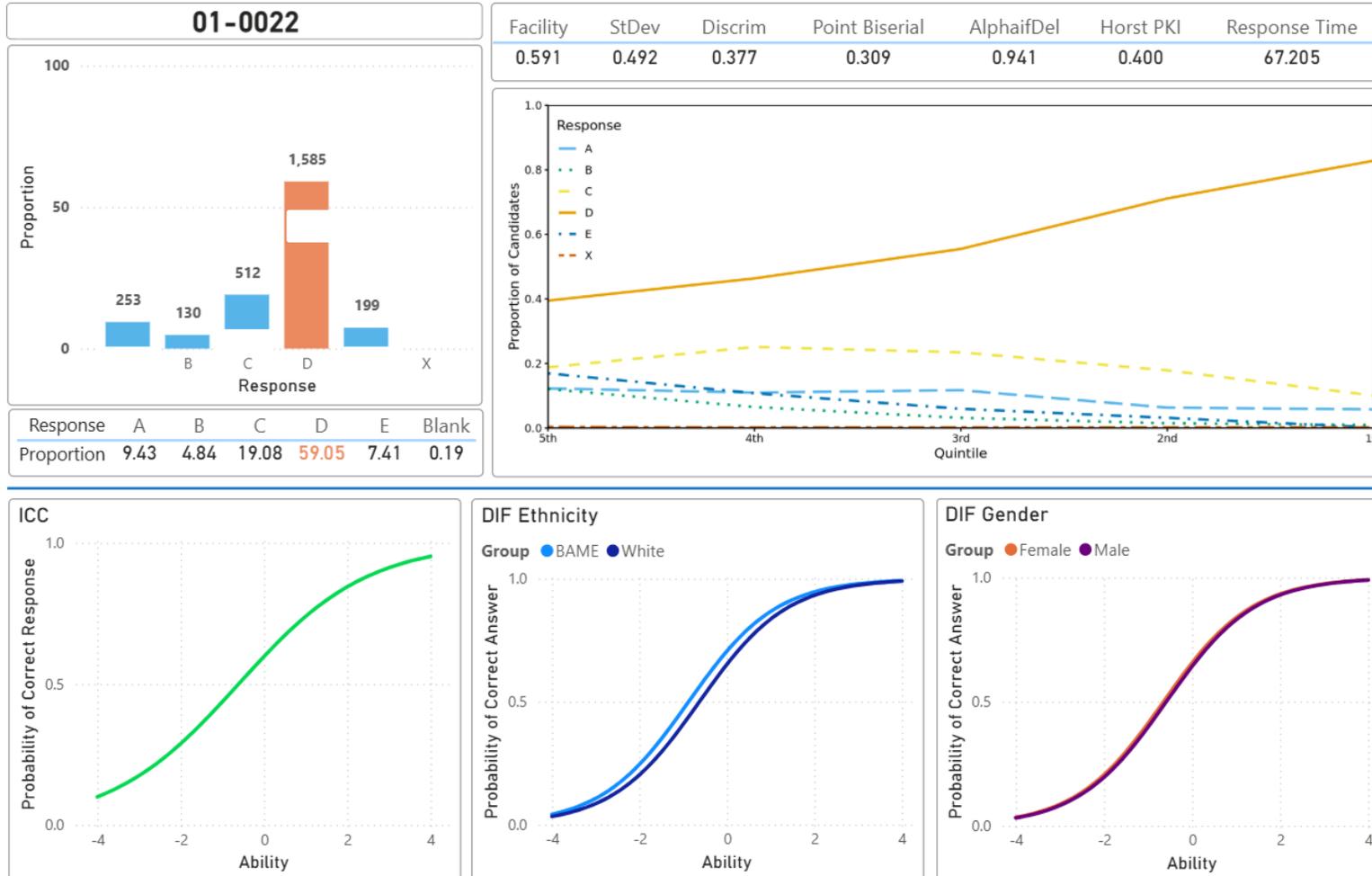

SQE1: single best answer MCQs

Are single best answer MCQs perfect?

- 'Cuing' effect?
- Ability to guess

- Question writing process
- Review the data

Pre-tested sample questions:	
FLK1	57.0%
FLK2	49.2%
Average	53.1%
SQE1 assessments:	
FLK1	57.5%
FLK2	54.9%
Average	56.2%
